



Articulated Roman doll from the Grottarossa mummy.

This is a doll made of dark ivory from the 2nd century AD. It was found in Rome in an elaborately decorated marble sarcophagus of an eight year old girl, who had been mummified.

The sarcophagus was found at Grottarossa, to the north of Rome, and is now commonly known as the Grottarossa Mummy. It is now held in the National Roman Museum at the Palazzo Massimo.

Many hundreds of similar figures made of clay or wood have been found, which are often identified as votives; offerings made to a god or goddess.
